The word translated “inspired” in 2 Timothy 3:16 is literally “God breathed.” God Himself spoke every word.

2. Prophecy shows that the Bible is inspired by God. One-fourth of the Bible consists of prophecies about future events. The Bible claims to be 100 percent accurate in these predictions (Deuteronomy 18:20-22). Below are three of the prophecies about Christ’s first coming.

Event	Prophecy	Fulfillment
Place of birth	“But as for you Bethlehem Ephrathah...from you One will go forth from Me to rule in Israel.” Micah 5:2 —700 B.C	“Now Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea.” Matthew 2:1 —1 A.D.
Betrayed for 30 pieces of silver	“So they weighed out 30 shekels of silver as my wages ...that magnificent price at which I (the Lord) was valued by them.” Zechariah 11:12,13 —500 B.C.	“Judas Iscariot went to the chief priests... And they weighed out to him thirty pieces of silver.” Matthew 26:14,15 —32 A.D.
Garments divided	“They divide My garments among them and for My clothing they cast lots.” Psalm 22:18 —1000 B.C.	“They divided up His garments among themselves, casting lots.” Matthew 27:35 —32 A.D.

What chance would the prophets have of predicting these events in their own wisdom? Peter Stoner, in his book *Science Speaks*, calculates the probability of the prophets predicting eight similar events without supernatural help. He calculated they would have the same chance as a blindfolded man would have of choosing one marked silver dollar out of a mass of silver dollars covering the state of Texas two feet deep.¹ These are only eight of the more than 300 prophecies fulfilled in Christ.

Supplement A: Memorizing

Someone has said that we remember about 15 percent of what we hear 24 hours after we hear it. We remember about 30 percent of what we read and about 60 percent of what we study. But we remember close to 100 percent of what we memorize and review.

In order to follow the Lord and grow in love for Him, we must not only hear, read and study the Word of God, we must learn to hide it in our heart (memorize and meditate) as David did. The most important

step in memorizing is making up your mind to do it! If you have any doubts as to how important this is, read Proverbs 7:1-3 and Joshua 1:8.

There are three basic principles that should be applied to every verse that is memorized. They are:

Association—Study the context and background of the verse.

Impression—Impress it in your mind in every way possible:

1. Read the verse in other translations.
2. Quote the verse aloud (walking helps).
3. Emphasize each word of the verse.
4. Write the verse.
5. Visualize what the verse is saying.

Repetition—Consistent, regular repetition is the key to successful memorizing.

Don't be discouraged when you think you have a verse memorized the first day and then you can't quote it the next. This is the learning process. In order to memorize something, you must learn it, forget it: learn it, forget it: learn it—and you've got it. Remember, Scripture memory is not an end in itself. The goal of Scripture memory is to "meditate on it day and night" so that we might obey God's Word.

Former broadcaster Earl Nightingale, in his lecture "The Common Denominator of Success" said:

"Perhaps you've been discouraged by a feeling that you were subject to certain dislikes peculiar to you, with which successful people are not afflicted. Perhaps you have wondered why it is that those who accomplish the most seem to like to do the things that you don't like to do. They don't! And I think this is the most important and encouraging statement I have offered to any person.

But if they don't like to do these things, then why do they do them? Because by doing the things they don't like to do, they can accomplish the things they want to accomplish...Successful people have a strong purpose—strong enough to make them form the habit of doing things they don't like to do in order to accomplish the purpose they want to accomplish."

Is your desire to do the will of God strong enough to form in you the habit of memorizing Scripture? I hope it is.

THE WORD

The following is a list of basic verses for the disciple who is just starting to memorize. These verses cover several foundational truths in the Scriptures and will give the follower of Jesus Christ a basic working arsenal. They will meet your personal needs as well as help prepare you to be able to give an answer to those who ask about your Christian faith. The New Testament Church was a very simple and yet incredibly effective organism that God created. Church leaders equipped their flock, and those churches were involved in all kinds of works of service and outreach. The New Testament Church impacted and shaped the world.
